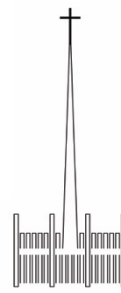

Saying Sorry

'Sorr-ee!' We've all said it – and not meant it. Perhaps that's sometimes because we feel it is something that is expected of us, rather than because it is something we have actually thought through and want to do. And when that is the case, you can spot it a mile off. How many times have we found ourselves annoyed that a train has been delayed, but failed to find any comfort in the automated announcement that 'we are sorry for the delay and any inconvenience this may cause'? How can a pre-recorded voice be sorry? It can't, and we feel even more annoyed as a result, or at least, I do!

Many of us will have been told as children that we should only say sorry if we mean it. It is a truism, of course, but it is also good advice. Saying sorry means nothing unless we are prepared to accept responsibility, make changes, and, if we can, mend the hurts which we have caused. Sometimes penitence, or being sorry, is highly personal and relates to specific actions we have taken. Sometimes, it is more about owning a collective responsibility for wrongs within an institution or society.

The last few weeks have seen two publications which challenge us to take exactly this collective responsibility, and which demand that we address pain and injustice. The first is the IICSA (Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse) Report on the Diocese of Chichester which catalogues not only the past failure of the Church of England to protect people from harm, but worse, a culture which seems to have been complicit in covering up abuse. The second is data from *End Child Poverty*, which reveals that the local authority ward with the highest percentage of children living in poverty is here in Blackburn, just minutes' walk from the Cathedral.

As a Church, as a community, we could say how terrible this is. But that isn't being sorry. Being sorry is accepting that the Church of England has wronged many vulnerable people. Being sorry is accepting that the society of which we a part perpetuates inequality. And being sorry, being really sorry, is doing something about it.

7th July at 7:00 pm - 8:30 pm

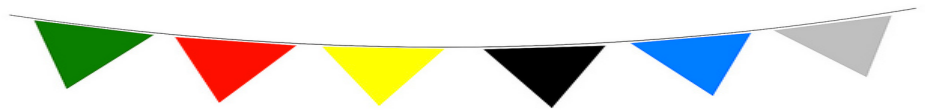

Our audit will take place in the autumn, and we look forward to it as an opportunity to keep improving in our Christian duty of care.

The scandal of social inequality also demands action. So, if we are really sorry, then yes, let's say that we are. But let's also show that we are, by doing something about it.

JUST ONE PERSON – JUST ONE THING

Onjali Q Rauf – award winning author and campaigner for women's rights and refugees, will be sharing Her Story and the creation and unexpected journeys Making Herstory continues to lead her on, and why there is no such thing as an action too small.

This will be an exciting, informative, lively and uplifting interactive event that will showcase not only Onjali's own experiences in seeing this particular truth unfold, but also in the volunteering work of local people in Blackburn with Darwen and Burnley.

How often have we thought 'What can I do' whilst watching wars unfold, hearing of refugees dying out at sea or reading of yet another abuse, rape or murder. But what we all too often forget is the ripple effects that a single action launched with a simple intention can yield.

In 2011 Onjali's aunt was murdered by the husband she had been trying to escape from for over five years, highlighting the systematic failures around the abuse and murders of women in the United Kingdom. Determined to do something in memory of her aunt, Onjali set up Making Herstory. Today Making Herstory has a network of active supporters across the UK. Working with agencies large and small, it has supported women's shelters and outreach projects including refugee projects here and in France.
